Branch notes

Branch meeting report – October '09

Who knew that Identity Services did so many interesting things besides recording and maintaining the vital records of births, deaths and marriages? Two long-serving staff members of the Department of Internal Affairs, Eileen Kennedy and Alison Ainsworth, enlightened members at our October branch meeting about the extent of their work.

It was fascinating to hear just how many people search the New Zealand vital records online. Between 2000 to 3000 unique visitors go to the site every day, and altogether they account for about 80,000 page views per day. Since the database went online, it has experienced 10 million searches. About 30 percent of the searches are initiated by people overseas, which begs the question – are any of them looking for the same people we are?

The new, shorter URL for searching vital records is www.bdmrecords.dia.govt.nz.

1911 Census

The 1911 Census of England and Wales is now available free to members at the Alison Procter Family History Centre (APFHC). Access is from findmypast.com on PC2. Click on the findmypast.com logo on the desktop display and when the home page comes up, left click on the 'sign in' prompt top right. When the branch acknowledgement appears, click one of the tabs across the top of the screen – census, military, migration, etc. Ignore the pay-as-you-go columns as we have an Explorer subscription.

On the web

Lost records

When you think of the vast amount of genealogical information available on the internet and in repositories, it can be hard to believe that the bit of information about the particular ancestor

you're searching for just isn't there, somewhere. Surely, if you look long enough, you'll track it down. Won't you? Sorry, but maybe you won't. The bad news is that lots of records get lost or destroyed, one way or another. The dangers are many, ranging from seemingly benign light, heat, humidity, dust and acidified paper, to natural disasters such as fires and floods, and war.

It's a big concern to archivists, who have the task of preserving documents that are sometimes badly damaged. About 6000 of 6250 repositories surveyed by UNESCO in 1994 reported suffering losses to their collections. You can read about all the ways records can be lost or destroyed (accidentally and on purpose) in the 77-page report entitled, *Archives destroyed in the twentieth century*, found at the website below.

Genealogy toolbar

Manchester and Lancashire Family History Society (MLFHS), based in the UK is pleased to announce the release of its genealogy toolbar which integrates seamlessly with your browser (IE, Firefox, Safari) to provide instant access to family history sites including online BMD, Archives, Societies, Pay to View and many more.

The toolbar is completely free to download and use and has been developed by Family Historians for use by Family Historians. Changes to the toolbar are made centrally and can be instantly reflected in each user's personal copy. We keep track of the links so that users do not have to. The range of links provided is especially strong for Great Britain and Irish research.

There are currently over 120 links and these will be expanded in response to user comments and suggestions. Users can turn individual menus ON AND OFF AND can also choose to add items from a selection of non-genealogy links. Lost cousins

If anyone else out there is researching your ancestors, the Lost Cousins site may be able to put you in touch with them. It uses census reference numbers (mainly from the 1881 British and Canadian censuses and the 1880 US census) to find matches. You give the names and reference numbers for your ancestors who appear on the censuses and indicate your relationship with them, and the database does the checking. The site predicts a match after an average of 63 names entered.

Even if you don't get a match, the exercise of establishing the particular people on each branch of your family tree who were living at that time may give you some ideas about further lines to follow up. There's also a newsletter of genealogical tidbits you can read online.
