The new Wellington settlement of 1840 found itself without an Anglican ordained minister who was able to perform marriages. One Richard Davy, a clerk in holy orders, who was **not** ordained and who was a little too fond of the bottle, carried out several illegal marriages. Don't miss Bill's fascinating insight into Davy's story and the consequences of his actions.

Bill and his wife Kay, who spoke to our meeting a couple of months ago, were two of the five founders of the Kapiti Genealogy Computer Group at a time the NZSG actively discouraged the use of computers.

How to - Register for Familysearch.org

Oh, that won't take long to either prepare or present, thought I.

As I was already registered, Sheila was roped in as the guinea pig for the screenshots to be presented at our May Monthly Meeting 'How To' slot.

An hour later we had: attempted to register, found what happens when you have already registered using the same email address, and snapshotted all the screens involved when you need to be reminded of either the user name that goes with the email address, and/or the associated password.

Trust me, it is simple, honest. Should only take a few minutes to think up a username, register your chosen username and email address, and verify your email address is valid. After which you are good to go.

Why register?

- Search the Family Tree
- Contact people who have contributed to the Family Tree
- Save sources found in searches to your Source Box
- Order films from the catalogue
- Pay back to others what benefits you've gained, by indexing scanned images

National Library Tour

On June 9th a group of seven did another excellent tour of the National Library. There is always benefit from taking these tours as each is different and often you learn new aspects of what is available for genealogists.

It is important to remember that the National Library has two collections - the Alexander Turnbull Library Collection and the National Library Collection. The reading rooms are open 10.00am - 5.00pm. Downstairs (virtual library) open 8.30am. Café opens 7.00am!

You access each collection differently. Registration for both is done via the National Library website. You will be given a card with your National Library number. Use this number to order records and books.

For the Alexander Turnbull Collections, (which are viewed in the Katherine Mansfield room in the library), you need to set up an unverified Real Me account, which is done via the National Library website. Those who have ordered new passports in recent times will be familiar with verified Real Me. Unverified means you do NOT need to get photos verified (as with passports). Follow instructions on the website. If you already have a verified Real Me, you can use that account. A staff member will help you if you are there in person.

The Alexander Turnbull Collection contains unpublished articles (such as diaries, church records), original publications, documents, maps, photos, paintings, audio recordings etc.

It is widely known that all Electoral Rolls are accessible, but a useful, less-known tool for family historians is the Habitation Index - which is the electoral roll by street name, *ie.* you can see who else was living in the same street. The Habitation Index starts from 1980 onwards.

The family history centre is on the first floor and there are always people to help you with any questions you might have. Try putting your family names, towns or anything you can think of in the website search field. It is amazing what is held there.

The Battle of Jutland

The Battle of Jutland - 31 May and 1 June 1916

To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Jutland, the National Records of Scotland (NRS) has written ***a feature article*** <<u>http://tracking.scotlandspeople.gov.uk/t/eccba23M6QBBLjlY1bB-Taa-AFzaaaaaaBLU-TOya?s=UN44253&c=UavN_Nmtlc.egl.px&n=u&z=&p=%7E63222></u> about the biggest sea battle of the First World War, telling the story of the battle and the effect that the loss of life had on Scotland - especially on small communities like Wick, in Caithness.

In total, 6,097 UK sailors and 2,551 German sailors died in the 2-day battle.

The sad case of Hannah Norman

My friend, NZSG member Marvyn Crone, sent me this tale of poor Hannah—her 4x great grandmother. It was a brick wall! Marvyn tells all.

"My Hannah was a mystery figure. According to family rumours, she was supposed to have been landed gentry with MONEY, then a Vicars wife, or even an Irish Go Go dancer with travelling gypsies! After a great deal of research between me and my lovely newly-found English cousin, we pinned Hannah down to Farrington Gurney, Midsomer Norton, or possibly Ashwick, in Somersetshire.

But the trail stopped there, until I was contacted by a lady from the Tasmanian Female Convict Society who recognized Hannah in my family tree on Ancestry. I was seriously stunned at first, but sure enough it was our very same Hannah.

I managed to find this report of her trial in the Taunton Courier, April 4th 1827. She was accused of stealing two half crowns from a shopkeeper who had marked the coins. She said that one had come from some men to procure beer, the other was handed to her by a young girl aged 14.

She was proclaimed innocent by the judge, but despite that was sent to Ilchester Prison to await transportation.

Poor Hannah, aged 43 with 7 children including a two year old that she had to leave, was transported on the ship

piated her offence.

Hannah Norman. (40) for stealing three half-crowns from James Thatcher. Prosecutor, a shopkeeper at Midsomer Nerton, had missed silver at various times, and in order to detect the culprit, he marked some half-crowns and put them is the till on the morning of the 9th of January. In the schernoon, on going to the till, missed the marked silver, and eleven shillings from another till. Prosecutor gave notice to the other shopkerpers in the village of his loss, and by that means found some of his money in the possession of Mr Smith, a brewer, and Mr Hayland, a grocer, who had received two of the half-crowns lost, from prisoner, in exchange for goods. The actual stealing of the money by prisoner was not in evidence, but her passing them was clearly proved.—In her defence, she said one of the half crowns Elizabeth Symonds, her fellow prisoner, gave her, the other she got from some men to procure beer,—Guilty.—Seven years' transportation

Sovereign to Van Diemen's Land in 1827. Little Hannah died. Three other daughters managed to get pregnant, and the vicar with little to do one Sunday afternoon baptised the three results, one of them being my great great grandmother, Hannah Dorse, nee Norman.

The records from Tasmania are fantastic; we have Hannah's height, blue eye colour and brown hair. We have a record of her as one of a couple asking permission for marriage - not granted of course. The last record of her was in 1836 from Trove. She was drunk and was sent to the chapel.

I would be drunk too. According to her report, she became the worst class of prisoner, spending quite a few days in solitary confinement on bread and water. Writing this now brings tears to my eyes as she was not supposed to be sent out - she was judged innocent. Sadly we cannot find any record of her death but I think she may lie in a paupers grave somewhere."

Our **Round Robin** magazine, FamilyTree, regularly offers free records from The Genealogist for up to 3 months from the sale date of the magazine, a good reason to sign up for it. See page 4 for details.
