1939 register in The Genealogist

The genealogist has released the 1939 register transcript <https://www.thegenealogist.co.uk/1939-register/> adding their powerful search tools and SmartSearch technology. This offers a very flexible way to look for your ancestors at the start of the Second World War.

Their well known 'brick wall shattering search tools' include the ability to find your ancestor in 1939 by using keywords, such as the individual's occupation or their date of birth. You can also search for an address and then jump straight to the household. If you're struggling to find a family, you can even search using as many of their forenames as you know.

Once you've found a record in the 1939 Register, you can click on the street name to view all the residents on the street, potentially finding relatives living nearby.



Tithe Maps added to Map explorer

The Genealogist seems to have been very busy during the UK lockdown. 2,700 more parishes of Tithe Maps have been added to their Map Explorer™ with the inclusion of **Anglesey, Durham, Devon, Shropshire, Somerset, Suffolk and Wiltshire**. This means over 30 counties of georeferenced Tithe Maps are now available! Have you tried this resource yet? If you are researching ancestors in the UK, it gives you a real sense of place.

From cottages with gardens to acres of farmed land and country estates, the addition of georeferenced Tithe maps as a layer over modern and other historical maps allows you to see how the landscape has changed over time. From a plot identified on the tithe map it is possible to see the description as it was recorded in the apportionment record at the time, thus revealing more about your ancestor's holding. You can also find other plots they owned or occupied.

New Records from FindMyPast

Philadelphia Roman Catholic Parish Records

Now that we can release new records from 1921, we added over 81,000 baptisms and marriages from the City of Brotherly Love.

England & Wales Deaths 2007-2020

Now available to search in their own standalone collection, explore over 353,000 new modern death records.

Ireland, Northern Ireland Deaths 1998-2020

We've created a distinct new record set for recent Northern Ireland deaths while adding over 5,000 additional records.

News from the National Library

FamilySearch Affiliate Library in The National Library, Wellington.

The "Kiosks" (computers) in the Reading room on level 1 at the National Library in Wellington have all been upgraded to windows 10 giving you access to FamilySearch and enabling us to assist you further. We are up and fully operational from Tuesday to Friday 10am-4pm and Saturday from 9am -1pm. We are now taking bookings for groups from out of Wellington as well as locals thus ensuring you a computer.

You may book through our email familysearchmswn@gmail.com or ring us on 04 474 3048 and leave a message supplying a landline phone number, contact name and number of your group plus how long you are visiting. You can also bring your own laptop as we have plenty of space and power outlets, so don't forget your charger. You can either download to your laptop yourself or we can download digital images on your behalf and email them to you.

Ancestors in County Cavan?

Michael McShane and his wife, Catherine Kerr have launched a new website – <https://cavantownlands.com> "your gateway to the history of each of Cavan's 2,000 townlands".

For anyone with ancestors in County Cavan this is a 'must look'. Michael and Catherine have completely overhauled cavantownlands.com which was first launched in 2015.

A search by townland will produce the following results in one location:

- Location map and basic townland information along with specific articles relevant to the townland where available.
- 1609 Bodley plantation map. Find out what your townland was called in 1609 and who the land was granted to under the Plantation of Ulster.
- 1652 Commonwealth survey data and maps for all parishes. After the quashing of the 1641 rebellion, the lands were re-granted by Cromwell and the new Proprietor name for each townland is provided.
- 1830 Tithe Applotment records for 35 of the 36 civil parishes. Re-indexed, corrected and presented in searchable tabulated form for ease of access.
- 1836 Name Book records for the townlands of 9 parishes first published in The Heart of Breifne 1979-1987.
- 1841 Census of Killashandra. Cross checked, corrected and fully searchable data set. This a unique record of all inhabitants, their name, age, occupation, educational and marriage status and more.
- 1865 Griffith's valuation records. Covers the entire of County Cavan. Tenant names are provided.

All included townland records have been referenced to their official Logainm identifier. Logainm.ie is the official database of Irish place names.

This is a great example of the detail that can be found in sometimes-difficult Irish research. Ed.

Facilities at the Alison Procter Family History Centre

The APFHC is located at Paraparaumu Library . Turn right inside the library entrance to the area containing six computers, microfiche and library. The cupboard on the right hand side of the area contains the red folders mentioned below.

Members need to get the cupboard key from the library Welcome Desk, when you will be asked to sign for the key and show your membership card for the current year.

Computer Password at the APFHC

The APFHC computer password changes regularly: check the red Computer Help folder in the top drawer.

Please sign the red signing-in book found in the top drawer.

Keyboards are in the lowest drawer.

Replace the cover on the computer when you leave and lock the keyboard in the cupboard.

All six computers have subscriptions to Ancestry, FindMyPast and access to The Genealogist and Roots Ireland as well as free sites like FamilySearch. (Use your own log-in to FamilySearch).

NB. Please do **NOT** sign out of RootsIreland, FindMyPast or TheGenealogist.

A microfiche is available and there are books on a variety of topics which can be borrowed. Boxes of copies of 'Who do you think you are' and 'Family Tree' are on the shelf. The Paraparaumu library also has copies of 'Family Tree' on their magazine shelves.

You are encouraged to save the results of your searches on a USB memory stick or send them to your own email address.

We have a printer if you wish to print a hard copy. Please put 10c per copy in the honesty box on the cupboard door.

Please **do not switch off** the printer.
