This can include any of the following we have time for: testing there and/or uploading your test from the other testing companies, uploading a tree, connecting known matches to their place on your tree, navigating the site, and the additional testing that is offered by **only** FTDNA, of all the big companies.

1. Ancestry holds two useful databases in their freemasonry Membership registrations dataset: England, united Grand lodge of England freemason Membership registers, 1751-1921 and Ireland, Grand lodge of freemasons of Ireland Membership registers, 1733-1923.

2. The Grand lodge of Ireland Museum, library & archive <https://freemason.ie/museum-library-archive> helps researchers to learn more about the details of their ancestors' membership or for researching the Masonic fraternity in general.

All six computers have subscriptions to Ancestry, FindMyPast and access to The Genealogist and Roots Ireland as well as free sites like FamilySearch. (Use your own log-in to FamilySearch).

**NB.** Please do **NOT** sign out of RootsIreland, FindMyPast or TheGenealogist.

A microfiche is available and there are books on a variety of topics which can be borrowed. Boxes of copies of 'Who do you think you are' and 'Family Tree' are on the shelf. The Paraparaumu library also has copies of 'Family Tree' on their magazine shelves.

You are encouraged to save the results of your searches on a USB memory stick or send them to your own email address.

We have a printer if you wish to print a hard copy. Please put 10c per copy in the honesty box on the cupboard door.

Although they both start with your DNA match, the bits in between rely on a huge pool of resources, the bulk of which in both cases include other family trees, and record hints that may or may not be relevant / accurate. All hints are welcome!
