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

Choosing your Family History Software

I hope you all learnt something from the June monthly meeting's presentation on choosing software to aid your family history, even if it's "I'm happy with what I've got thank you"! Here's my "in a nutshell" version.

Why you might want a desktop program: - do you want ALL of your data online?
- do you research across different sites?

With a program on your computer you can pull it all together in one place, keeping private the bits others will copy, correctly or incorrectly from any online tree. Your data is under your control.

What will a program offer you?

In essence all the main programs on offer can do the basics, some better than others.

But all in all, provided your choice can export your data in a form any subsequent choice can read, you will be fine, your decision need not be final

The basics: - record and link families
- report the result - have the ability to create a GEDCOM to export to another program

Things to consider: What do YOU want the program to do?

The more fully featured programs available can:

- transform the paper clutter into readily findable family information at your fingertips
- help you research more effectively, ie by providing hints from the main research sites: FamilySearch, FindMyPast, MyHeritage and for two of the programs on offer, Ancestry, (The two licensed for this are FamilyTreeMaker and RootsMagic)
- provide advanced ways of looking at data to enable you to plan trips to visit relatives, archives, cemeteries etc; compare two versions of a database; tidy up your sources, places, names easily
- keep track of "to do" lists any which way you might like to do so
- provide a way of taking it with you, regardless of internet connections, when you go visiting
- be able to generate web pages for you

I add input efficiency to my list as I, as a touch typist, like to be able to record things easily and quickly and not all programs allow that. Also ask yourself, or ask around whether the program you are considering:

- has active support from the supplier, and a user support group, online or in person?
- does it suit your way of working?
- has it a future? And - will it continue to be supported and developed further?

So what to choose?

- - decide what is important to YOU. - try out those programs that look as though they might suit YOU
- - if they don't offer a free trial version, find someone who has it, go and try theirs.

Whichever you choose: **Take a back up regularly** and store a copy of that back up safely in a completely different location.

National Burial Grounds Survey

A Church of England in Great Britain project

1. Creating an accurate map of the burial ground using state-of-the-art technology
2. Scanning and transcribing the burial registers
3. Photographing every visible headstone, plaque and memorial
4. Linking registers, maps and photographs together on the system

Initially each BGMS (Burial Ground Management System) is a private database open only to those with permitted access. In due course there will be a publicly accessible website, allowing users to search for burial records from anywhere in the world. This will become the go-to online resource and will allow burial ground managers to utilise the information contained in their records for cultural projects, to attract visitors and generate income.

The first live publicly available BGMS sites are Kirkburton and Shelley burial grounds.

Click the highlighted names to look at these two examples. Click a plot and the names & dates appear, and on the right a dropdown box with tabs *Persons* and *Photos*.

Persons links to age, address & burial details and the original register page. *Photos* are of the plot.

All the information you could hope to find from a burial is there. The photos are sharp, maps clear and tabs make it easy to navigate.

A dream site for seeing a cemetery you can't visit.

Alison Proctor Family History Centre

Computer Password at the APFHC

The APFHC computer password changes regularly: check the red Computer Help folder in the top drawer.

Replace the cover on the computer when you leave and lock the keyboard in the cupboard.

All six computers have subscriptions to Ancestry, FindMyPast and access to The Genealogist and Roots Ireland as well as free sites like FamilySearch. (Use your own log-in to FamilySearch).

NB. Please do **NOT** sign out of RootsIreland, FindMyPast or TheGenealogist.

A microfiche is available and there are books on a variety of topics which can be borrowed.

Boxes of copies of 'Who do you think you are' and 'Family Tree' are on the shelf. The Paraparaumu library also has copies of 'Family Tree' on their magazine shelves.

You are encouraged to save the results of your searches on a USB memory stick or send them to your own email address.

We have a printer if you wish to print a hard copy. Please put 10c per copy in the honesty box on the cupboard door.

Please **do not switch off** the printer.

I-BY21380

Haplogroup I-BY21380 represents a man who is estimated to have been born around 200 years ago, plus or minus 150 years.

That corresponds to about 1800 CE, with a 95% probability he was born between 1682 and 1912 CE.

I-BY21380's paternal lineage branched off from I-BY21372 and the rest of mankind about 500 years ago, plus or minus 200 years.

He is the most recent paternal line ancestor of all members of this group.

There are 4 DNA test-confirmed descendants, and they have specified that their direct paternal origins are from Scotland.

As more people test, the history of this genetic lineage might be further refined.


I-BY21380 descendants are from these countries:
