Robert Jillett the Whaler 1812-1860

Helen Hawkins presented the story of her g.g, grandfather, Robert Jillett, to both the March evening Branch meeting, and the Day Group the following day. A great effort Helen!

Robert had arrived at Kapiti Island in either 1836 or 1837 from Hobart, and set up a whaling station at Waiorua on the north end of the island.

On the 12th January 1840, Robert and the Fraser brothers signed a deed of settlement with Ngati Toa chief Rangihiroa, paying "one cask of best tobacco, and one hogshead of rum with one pair of good blankets" for a parcel of land called 'Wiorua' [Waiorua].

Robert finally abandoned the whaling station in about 1853.

Helen's story also extended back to Robert's father, Robert the Convict (1760-1832), so included information on early life in Tasmania.



The Hodders' Journey - part I

This story traces my Mother, Winifred Hodder's paternal line back to Somerset in England.

What was it that led my Great Great Grandparents to be our first Ancestors to emigrate from the United Kingdom to New Zealand, on board the ship "London"?

The county of Somerset is one of the most picturesque in all of England, and is well known for its cider, thatched cottages and beautiful farms. Our Ancestors came from the towns of Muchelney and Langport which were a centre of commerce and transport for many centuries. Muchelney was the site of one of the largest Abbeys in England which unfortunately fell into disrepair. However it's ruins are still visited by thousands to this day.





The name Hodder has several different origins in old England, one being "The Hod", meaning a small valley, so anyone living in one could be known as coming from "The Hod" for short or "Hodder" It is also the name of a tool used by labourers to carry bricks and mortar to where the bricklayers were working It consists of two slabs of wood mounted at right angles on the end of a pole and was used to hoist materials up to the builders. The Labourers using these tools were called "Hodders".

We will start the Hodder's journey with *William Hodder* who married Ann Lock in the mid 1700's (22 January 1760 to be precise) in Muchelney, Somerset.

The only child we can trace from this marriage was *Eli Hodder*, born in 1764, died in 1834. Eli married Joanna Sawtell on 9 February 1789, with whom he had five children: William, Ely, Ann, Robert (who died as an infant), then Robert (#2). We follow our lineage down through *William*, the eldest son born in 1789. He married Mary Tilley on 3 June 1811 and had six children: Joanna, Joseph, William, *Walter*, George and Mary Ann.

In the first half of the 19th century life was hard for those who were not well off. A general recession between 1838 and 1842 resulted in very low wages, very expensive and poor quality food (meat was rarely seen on a labourer's table). Living standards were low, overcrowding and unemployment prevailed.

Life was not easy during this time due to the Industrial Revolution, with sweatshops, child labour and poor houses – the abuse of human rights was widespread. People were being transported to Australia for stealing a loaf of bread. Emigration was seen as a way to escape the grinding poverty and the key to making a good future for families. William was a labourer and as such with six children life would've been one long hard slog, working very long hours, eating – if lucky, and sleeping in very poor conditions. The children would have started work at an early age and schooling would have been a pipe dream.

With the New Zealand Company offering free passages to New Zealand for labourers, advertising that labourers would be guaranteed work, be well paid and have opportunities to buy land, four of William and Mary's children decided to leave the hardships they endured behind them. Walter and wife Emma (my direct line) in 1842; Joseph, his wife Elizabeth and family in 1854; followed by Mary Ann and husband Edward Jewell arriving in 1873; all emigrating to New Zealand. Brother George settled in New South Wales in Australia.

Topic: **TheGenealogist**, with particular emphasis on their map explorer.



DNA News

The DNAPainter chromosome map has had a couple of optional features added.

- Show centromeres on chromosomes?
- Show megabase guides on expanded chromosomes? NEW
- Show keylines on expanded chromosomes?
- Show slider to restrict segment display by cM? NEW

Ever wished you could easily see where on a chromosome a group of segments started or ended? Just pop into the Settings and click on Show megabase guides on expanded chromosomes. The grid lines are every 10 million megabases.

While in the Options also check the Show slider to restrict segment display by cM. It pops up above the chromosome map next to the search box.







Hide segments below 20cM

This latter is particularly useful if you have a map that you import your segment data from more than one site into for a cross company view of all your matching segments. Being able to filter out the smaller segments to concentrate on the larger is very easy to do.
